#### CLUB ALBUM - Pictures Wanted.

This trip includes an hours ride on the Union Steamship leaving Saturday 2 p.m. or 7:30 p.m. in the evening. A dance in the main dance hall till midnight, and afterwards refreshments will be served in the dance hall by the bay by the Social Committee where a fire in the huge fireplace may be enjoyed until the morning. Take sleeping bags to use in the lower dance hall. Bring 3 or 4 meals and a cup of tea. We have the use of the lower dance hall from 8 p.m. Saturday. Boat Tickets, if spoken for before Friday noon, July 15th, will cost \$1.00. Including dance and stopover till Sunday evening or Monday 8 a.m.

For those wishing to go over on the Sunday 10 a.m. boat to climb Mt. Gardner, arrangements will be made to climb immediately after the morning boat arrives. (Soon after 11 a.m.) If any wish to climb by moonlight, a suitable leader will be available.

Fred Perry expects to accompany us and tell us about the shrubs and flowers on the way. If possible to make the trip, Roy Howard will lead the Sunday 11 a.m. party up the mountain by the south trail.
